


















WHEN COINS ENTER THE GAME!

Monnaie de Paris presents the exhibition
"Insert Coin. Pinball machines, arcade terminals and coin-operated games"
from March 1st to June 30th, 2024.

"Insert Coin" will immerse visitors in a retrospective of coin-operated gaming machines in the public space, from the post-war period through to the 2000s. The exhibition features a popular and contemporary theme, inviting visitors to discover a playful aspect of the history of coinage, rooted in the social history of the 20^{th} century and the world of technological innovation in the service of entertainment.

"Insert Coin" chronologically traces the birth and rise of table soccer, pinball machines, jukeboxes, video game terminals and other electromechanical games that populated cafés and arcades and formed an important part of the culture of teenagers and young adults during this period. Through its scenography and a few iconic objects, the exhibition also evokes the bars and cafés where these machines were found.

The visitor experience is resolutely interactive, with some forty playable period machines, offering visitors the opportunity to relive the excitement of using a coin to activate a game. For the occasion, Monnaie de Paris will issue tokens that visitors will receive at the start of the tour, enabling them to play with these machines in their original material conditions. This experience will enable several generations to interact within the exhibition, encouraging exchanges between game enthusiasts from different eras.


The history of amusement machines dates back to 15th century France; they spread widely across Europe in the 18th century. The ancestors of pinball machines became particularly popular at the end of the 19th century, especially in the United States. The first coin-activated game appeared in Chicago in the early 1930s, the same year the French table soccer created by the Bonzini brand. The following years saw the emergence of coin-operated pinball machines, which became increasingly complex and entertaining, as well as the development of cafés and arcade culture.

The emergence of electronics played an essential role in the evolution of these machines, enabling the creation of new types of pinball machines and then video games. The exhibition also evokes the importance of the "high score" concept and the incentive to perform. Each time a player loses a game, he or she has to put a coin back into the game, and is encouraged to finish without losing a life. The 1980s saw the emergence of arcades dedicated to coin-operated entertainment games, while table soccer and pinball machines became sports in their own right. Later, the popular skill and fighting games of the 1980s-1990s, such as Pac-Man and Street Fighter II, gave birth to E-Sports.

The "Insert Coin" exhibition traces the history of these iconic machines through eight rooms, each evoking a different era, from the 50s to the 2000s.

Through the eyes and expertise of its two curators, the **"Insert Coin"** exhibition promises an unprecedented retrospective and interactive experience that will delight fans of video games, history and pop-culture.

"The "Insert Coin" exhibition aims to help visitors rediscover a forgotten aspect of the history of money: coin-operated entertainment machines in cafés. It brings this practice back to life, interactively, using working period machines along a chronological route. The gesture is at the heart of the exhibition. The act of inserting coins into the coin slot to activate the machine, pressing the button on the jukebox or arcade machine, turning the handles on the table soccer... It's also the atmosphere of the bars and the leisure activities of youth that the exhibition evokes through memory objects.'

ABOUT MONNAIE DE PARIS:

Since 864, Monnaie de Paris has been pursuing its original mission: minting coins for the State. It is the oldest French institution and one of the oldest companies in the world. On its historic site in the heart of Paris, behind the doors of an 18th-century palace, Monnaie de Paris houses the capital's last working factory, supporting arts and crafts through the production of exceptional products (medals, coins, decorations, objets d'art).
